SEASON 2014-15

The new season is upon us and the first match is the Annual friendly against South Birmingham on Monday 1st September.

The players and grades are given here along with the team formation. Opening matches are given on the back page. The Birmingham League's rules of play were in debate until a few days before the season was due to start. New rules regarding quickplay finishes were again on the table, but have been deferred and the matter is now being looked at by a League subcommittee. Other rules have been changed to reflect changes in FIDE laws of chess. These effectively mean the BDCL conditions of play do not change. However, the rule on mobile phones now states that if they make a sound, the game SHALL be lost. July 2015 sees the British Championship being held at Warwick University. The winners of the Birmingham and Leamington League top section individuals will qualify for a place in the Championship. However, if you have no aspirations in that event, you can still enter in the many sections of both League competitions.

Subscriptions for the 2014-15 season remain in the same format as previously. All players will need to pay for Bronze ECF membership by the end of September or will be charged £2 per League game played. Bronze membership is £12 if paid through the BDCL scheme. Silver membership is required to play in congresses and costs £18, or can be paid as a £6 supplement to bronze membership on the first occasion. ECF fees may be paid direct to the ECF online and some members may have

received a renewal notice. Membership of the chess club is £16 full, £8 senior citizen and needs to be paid by end of October. These fees need to be paid to the Treasurer, John Clulee.

There will again be a club Championship tournament run in two sections, as last season. Entries should go to Club Secretary, Robert Reynolds as soon as possible. Entry is free and there will be cash prizes as well as a trophy to hold for a year.

<u>CLUB</u> <u>CHAMPIONSHIP</u>

The Club Championship began early last season, with an Open section and a Minor section. Each section was split into two groups which were all-play-all. The two top players in each group met in semi-finals and finals to decide the winners. In the minor section, Paul Kelly beat Bram Garner in the minor section. John Clulee was winning against Tom Evans (Snr) but stalemated Tom and drew. There was a play-off which Tom won. Paul won game one of the final but was losing game two. However, tom made a series of errors and only drew, making Paul Champion.

In the Open section, Richard Smith beat Robert Reynolds to reach the final. Mark Cundy blundered a piece against Richard Reynolds, which meant a repeat of an eventful game in the group stages. In game one, Richard Smith retained the pressure throughout, but a fierce attack

was repelled. There was an opportunity to bail out to a draw, but a blunder meant the loss of a piece and a win for Richard Reynolds. Game two saw a more open game where both sides had chances. Material remained even until Richard Reynolds won a backward pawn on d6. After a series of exchanges, the game might have been drawn, but in the end it was a second win and the championship for 2013-14. Here is the second game.
